

Richard Danielpour (b. 1956)

Songs of Love and Loss · Canti Della Natura · Songs of My Father

I have known Hila Plitmann since 2010; since that time, we have collaborated on seven different works together. She has sung my music on five different Naxos recordings over the years (*Ancient Voices*, 8.578311-12; *Darkness in the Ancient Valley*, 8.559707; *The Passion of Yeshua*, 8.559885-86; *Toward a Season of Peace*, 8.559772; *String Quartet No. 7 'Psalms of Solace'*, 8.559845). We have each had such a productive professional relationship with Naxos of America and with one another, so it seemed fitting that we should create a recording together of three new works of mine, two of which were commissioned and composed expressly for Hila.

I chose the three works on this album – Songs of Love and Loss, Canti Della Natura ('Songs of Nature'), and Songs of My Father – in part because each work is in a different language. Each of these languages has been important and central to me throughout my life: Songs of Love and Loss is in Farsi, the language of my Persian ancestors; Canti Della Natura is in Italian, which is a language that I speak fluently from my many years of living in Italy; and Songs of My Father is derived from poems in English that were written by my father, Sayid Danielpour. These poems of my father, which have remained very dear to me throughout the years, were written in 1964 as love letters to my mother.

I am particularly pleased that in this recording each of these song cycles employ a different instrumentation. Songs of Love and Loss is written for voice and string orchestra, while Canti Della Natura accompanies the voice with piano and obbligato cello. Songs of My Father employs the most delicate of the three instrumentations with harp and viola complementing the voice.

The text in Songs of Love and Loss comes from the great Persian poet Rumi, whose poems were composed over 800 years ago. Many of Rumi's texts still resonate with relevance and poignancy today. The Iranshahr Orchestra, a new ensemble in Los Angeles devoted to Persian culture, is conducted artfully by its founder and music director Shahāb Pāranj. This five-movement song cycle was commissioned in 2019 by the Tucson Desert Song Festival, and it was premiered in Tucson on 17 January 2020, with Ms. Plitmann and assisting artists.

All the instrumentalists accompanying Ms. Plitmann are wonderful artists whose sensitivity and refined approach throughout the process was a blessing in the making of this recording. Pianist Inna Faliks and cellist Antonio Lysy both shine in *Canti Della Natura*. The text for this cycle is attributed to Antonio Vivaldi. These sonnets, which accompanied the first printed edition of Vivaldi's *Four Seasons*, are not nearly as well known as the work associated with them, but they have a particular presence and power of their own. The sonnets give voice to the natural cycle of birth, death, and rebirth, which is a common theme in all three works on this album. One of my favorite tracks on the entire album is the *Intermezzo* 14, which is an interlude for cello and piano alone. The work was commissioned in 2019 by the Curtis Institute of Music and Ken Lipper to celebrate the 80th birthday of our mutual friend Nicola Bulgari. Soprano Elena Perroni sang several performances of the cycle in Europe during the fall of 2022 with "Curtis on Tour," while the American premiere was presented at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia on 19 April 2023, with Ms. Perroni and assisting artists from Curtis.

Harpist Marcia Dickstein and violist David Walther accompany Ms. Plitmann with grace and tenderness in the three Songs of My Father. This cycle is perhaps the gentlest of the three works on the album. It was commissioned in 2021 by Marcia Dickstein and the Debussy Trio. The first performance was given in Los Angeles on 27 April 2022, with Marcia Dickstein, David Walther, and Ms. Plitmann.

A very crucial part of making a good recording possible is a copyist who can prepare scores and performance materials that make the process clear and straightforward. Anthony Constantino engraved all three of these works and made appropriate revisions after the initial premieres to ensure that we had a dependable final edition for each of the pieces on this recording.

And finally, this recording would not have been possible without our producer, Gordon Bahary, who produced and engineered the album. Steve Kaplan was also secured as an engineer to assist in the Ostin Recording Studio at UCLA in April 2023. Creating a consistent and cohesive recording of these vastly different ensembles provided a unique challenge which Gordon readily accepted, and he masterfully delivered an overall sound that we can all be proud of for many years.

Hila Plitmann



Two-time GRAMMY Award-winning soprano, songwriter, and actress Hila Plitmann is known for opera, concert, film, and theater performances filled with emotionally charged fearlessness, unique expressivity, and mesmerizing drama. She rose to prominence after premiering a work by Del Tredici with the New York Philharmonic just one year after graduating from Juilliard - on only two weeks' notice - and has since become a frequent soloist on major stages across the world. Widely recognized as one of today's foremost interpreters of contemporary music, she regularly performs new works by a diverse array of composers, as well as traditional repertoire, and boundary-pushing projects in non-classical genres. With jazz guitarist Shea Welsh and tabla virtuoso Aditya Kalyanpur, she co-founded global music project Renaissance Heart. Her tour-de-force role in Eric Whitacre's groundbreaking electro-musical Paradise Lost: Shadows and Wings at Boston Court Pasadena, involving singing, acting, dancing, and martial arts, won her a nomination as Best Actress in a Musical from the Los Angeles Ovation Awards and Ticketholder Awards. She leads innovative residencies and workshops at campuses across the United States, bringing diverse pedagogical methods combining technical focus, tools and approaches for connecting, and a sense of inner confidence, mindfulness, centering, and presence. www.hilaplitmann.com

David Walther



Violist and composer David Walther joined The Debussy Trio in 1999 and has subsequently performed hundreds of recitals and children's concerts both domestically and abroad. Four albums of music commissioned and recorded by the trio have been commercially released, all to critical acclaim. He was a founding member of the New Hollywood String Quartet, and currently performs with the California String Quartet. As an LA studio musician Walther has contributed to over seven hundred soundtracks for movies and television. He has written pieces ranging from symphonies, songs, chamber music, solo instrumental, and incidental music, and has released two recordings of his own chamber music on the Albany Records label: *Threads of the Heart* (2013), and *Distance* (2021).

Antonio Lysy (1963–2024)



An artist of international stature and dedicated pedagogue, Antonio Lysy performed as a soloist in major concert halls worldwide. He collaborated with distinguished conductors including Yuri Temirkanov, Charles Dutoit, Sir Yehudi Menuhin, Sándor Végh, and Kees Bakels, and performed regularly both as a solo and chamber music artist. Lysy recorded extensively for CBC Radio, BBC Radio, Classic FM, and other radio networks. He enjoyed exploring the versatility of the cello's voice, from Baroque to electric, and was committed to projects that enriched his diverse musical interests. Based on his Latin GRAMMY Award-winning album, the touring multimedia show *Te Amo, Argentina* met with widespread acclaim. Lysy taught at the University of California, Los Angeles for 20 years from 2003.

Inna Faliks



Ukrainian-born pianist Inna Faliks has established herself as one of the most communicative and poetic artists of her generation. She has collaborated with composers Timo Andres, Billy Childs, Richard Danielpour, Clarice Assad and others, and created the interdisciplinary projects *Music/Words* and *Polonaise-Fantaisie: The Story of a Pianist*. Faliks has performed solo recitals at major international venues, and chamber music recitals with Gilbert Kalish, Rachel Barton Pine and Fred Sherry among numerous other noted artists. Her discography includes *Manuscripts Don't Burn* (Sono Luminus, 2024), and her memoir, *Weight in the Fingertips: A Musical Odyssey from Soviet Ukraine to the World Stage* was published by Backbeat Books in 2023. Faliks is a professor and head of piano at the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music.

Marcia Dickstein



Harpist Marcia Dickstein has commissioned and/or premiered over 175 compositions by American composers, appeared on numerous chamber music and solo recordings including the award-winning *3 Friends, Chamber Music of Arnold Bax* and the latest with The Debussy Trio, *Angles of Angeles* (Klavier, Harmonia Mundi, and RCM labels), and played on over 500 film scores, including *Toy Story 1–4, La La Land* and *Oppenheimer*. Dickstein has performed and recorded with Snoop Dogg, Taylor Swift, Stevie Wonder and Childish Gambino. As founder/artistic director of The Debussy Trio, now in its 35th year, she has performed worldwide, and over NPR radio and on commercial and PBS television. She also plays with the Long Beach Symphony and freelances in Los Angeles.

The Iranshahr Orchestra



The Iranshahr Orchestra is driven by a profound mission dedicated to providing steadfast support for composers, performers, and educators, with a primary focus on the promotion and preservation of Iranian music. Annually, the orchestra takes pride in commissioning, performing, and presenting premieres of works written by Iranian composers. The Iranshahr Orchestra distinguishes itself as a culturally diverse orchestra/ensemble with a platform, aesthetic, organization, and structure rooted beyond European musical ideas and aesthetics. While incorporating instruments from Iran and neighboring countries, it is not confined to the Western classical orchestra format. Avāz-e Jān, an ongoing project that collaborates with prominent Iranian musicians, and the commissioning of distinguished works by composers such as Richard Danielpour, Reza Vali, and Ian Krouse, stand out as highlights in The Iranshahr Orchestra's recent endeavors.

Shahāb Pāranj



Recipient of the 2024 Hoefer Prize, Shahāb Pāranj is an Iranian-American composer, conductor, instrumentalist, and educator. Renowned as a pioneer among his generation, he excels in both Western classical and Persian music, demonstrating outstanding expertise in both professional and academic spheres. Known for integrating Persian and Western composition techniques, he has received commissions from respected ensembles and organizations, such as the Russian String Orchestra, Intersection Contemporary Music Ensemble, Long Beach Opera, and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. As a tombak virtuoso, he has performed, recorded, and collaborated with some of the most celebrated artists worldwide. He holds degrees in music composition from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, the Manhattan School of Music, and the University of California, Los Angeles, where he received his PhD. Pāranj is the founder and music director of The Iranshahr Orchestra and the artistic director of Du Vert à L'infini, a contemporary music festival in the Franche-Comté region of France. He currently serves as a faculty member at the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music.

Richard Danielpour



GRAMMY Award-winning composer Richard Danielpour has established himself as one of the most gifted and sought-after composers of his generation. His music has attracted an international and illustrious array of champions, and, as a devoted mentor and educator, he has also had a significant impact on the younger generation of composers over the past 30 years. His list of commissions include some of the most celebrated artists of our day including Yo-Yo Ma, Jessye Norman, Susan Graham, the Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson Trio, the Guarneri and Emerson String Quartets, the New York City, Pacific Northwest and Nashville Ballets, and institutions such as the New York Philharmonic, Orchestre National de France, Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, and many more. With Nobel Laureate Toni Morrison, Danielpour created *Margaret Garner*, his first opera, which premiered in 2005. He has received two awards from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, including a Lifetime Achievement Award; a Guggenheim Award; the Bearns Prize from Columbia University; two Rockefeller Foundation Fellowships; and The Berlin Prize from the American Academy in Berlin. He served on the composition faculty of the Manhattan School of Music from 1993 to 2017 and is currently professor of music at the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music and a member of the faculty of the Curtis Institute of Music.

In April 2019, JoAnn Falletta led the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and Chorus in performances of *The Passion of Yeshua*. The subsequent album (Naxos 8.559885-86) was nominated for three GRAMMY Awards in 2021, winning in the category of Best Choral Performance.

In 2020, the Oregon Bach Festival commissioned Danielpour to compose *An American Mosaic* as a response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Pianist Simone Dinnerstein gave a livestreamed premiere and the critically acclaimed corresponding album, released on Supertrain Records, was recently nominated for a GRAMMY Award for Best Classical Instrumental Solo.

In 2021, Danielpour was commissioned by Orchestra della Toscana to write a piece for the 700th anniversary of Dante's death, making him the first American composer in nearly 40 years to be commissioned by a major Italian orchestra, and clarinetist Anthony McGill premiered Danielpour's *Four Angels* with the Catalyst Quartet. That same year, he was given a lifetime achievement award from the Cremona Music Festival and was awarded the Covel Chair from UCLA to support the composition and production of his opera *The Grand Hotel Tartarus*, which received its world premiere at the Freud Playhouse in Los Angeles in May 2024. Premieres in 2023/24 include *The Unhealed Wound*, a cantata composed for baritone Eric Owens and mezzo-soprano Amanda Lynn Bottoms; *Breaking the Veil*

and *Triptych*, both premiered by the ROCO chamber orchestra; and *Agnus Dei* performed by The Golden Bridge chorus conducted by Suzi Digby. Danielpour is one of the most recorded composers of his generation; many of his recordings can be found on the Naxos and Sony Classical labels. Danielpour's music is published by Lean Kat Music and Associated Music Publishers.

Richard Danielpour has collaborated frequently with soprano Hila Plitmann, and this album features three recent works, two of which were written specifically for her. The song cycles heard here are sung in three languages central to the composer's life. Songs of Love and Loss is in Farsi and sets the poetry of Rumi; Canti Della Natura, in Italian, takes sonnets attributed to Vivaldi in The Four Seasons; while Songs of My Father is set to the English poems of Danielpour's father. Each cycle features differing instrumentation and reflects Danielpour's longadmired compositional subtlety and refinement.

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
